#### Creating a "Most Joyous Space"

Most of us have special places where we can go when we need to restore feelings of safety, wholeness, contentment and happiness. Maybe one of these places is at home, in a comfy chair overlooking a cheerful place in the yard, next to a stack of favorite reading material and a steaming cup of tea, coffee or hot chocolate. Perhaps one of your special places is vacation spot that soothes your soul every year when you return to its delights.

Can you recall a day that was so happy that you never wanted it to end? Early Christians regarded the extravagantly joyful promise of the Resurrection as such a day. So, they declared an Easter season, the "great fifty days" between Easter Sunday and Pentecost, as a time of continuous feasting and welcoming new members into the Christian family. Tertullian, a second-century great thinker among our early Christian ancestors, called these fifty a "most joyous space."

Athanasius, an early Christian Bishop, wrote festive letters to all the churches each Easter much like pastors write to modern parishioners during Lent and Advent. In his letters, Bishop Athanasius encouraged all Christians to keep the "great fifty days" not as days of suffering but as days of a "time of joy and fulfillment." He called Christians to tap into the joy of Christ, in whose blessings "we are fed every day."

In the early Church, Christians everywhere made Easter Season worship experience into a special place where they could feel the Holy Spirit's gifts of comfort and safety, where they could feel restored and whole in the eternal salvation brought about by Jesus' resurrection, where they could find contentment and true happiness in the gift of life and unconditional love from the God who creates and sustains all life. Everywhere, Lenten fasts were replaced with lavish feasts, reflecting the abundance that God offers. Rather than kneeling for prayers, God's people would stand to pray and sing alleluias.

We have a wonderful legacy of enthusiastic delight in the Easter Season. How can we carry on this legacy and pass it along to the next generation in our church, so that the "great fifty days" we are in the midst of now can truly be one awesome, long feast? How can we Easter People make our church "a most joyous space," a special place where all who enter feel whole and happy? One answer lies not just in how tidy and welcoming we keep our worship space, but in what we each bring to worship. What do you pack when you go to that favorite vacation spot? Chances are, you spend days choosing clothes, packing snacks, taking care of every detail so that the trip happens without a hitch. The day before you leave, chances are people would see a spring in your step, a broad smile on your face as they greet you. Chances are, you would delightedly and eagerly tell your friends and neighbors about your plans.

What do you pack before you adventure to church on Sundays? Do you get excited about what you will wear, who you will see? Are you so excited on Saturday that everyone you meet will notice your beaming face? Are you excited to tell everyone that you are going to a great feast on Sunday? Or, do you drag yourself out of bed at the last minute on Sunday morning, silently begrudging lost sleep and annoyed at the effort it takes to dress up and put a smile on your tired face? Is church on Sunday becoming just one more optional social scene?

This is the Easter Season for restoring ourselves to an attitude of joy that can only come from a quality of fellowship with other Christian believers together in God's presence. You can't get the same quality hug, deep concern, unity of prayer, feeling of eternal stability, with an online chat buddy, your boss, a stranger in the grocery line, a fix of caffeine or alcohol, or someone you know superficially in a social club or group. If you are trying to find restoration to a sense of wholeness in these places, you will always be disappointed. You will always, to some degree, go away feeling lacking, empty, hungry for something better in life.

We worship a God whose agenda is restoration. That was the whole point of Jesus' life, persecution, crucifixion and resurrection: to give us a way to be fully and eternally restored to God. This Easter, God is waiting for you to surrender your personal agenda so that God's agenda can take over our individual and congregational lives. God is waiting. It is up to us to meet God half way. So, if you unpack your personal agenda, what do you pack and bring with you to Church on the Lord's Day? Please bring what matters. What matters most? Contemporary composer Darlene Zscech suggests that excellence in every detail matters. Offering anything less than your best to God would be demeaning.

Unity matters, so bring an attitude of generosity and forgiveness. We are bound to help build each other up. Unpack apathy and judgmental comments. God does not respond favorably to these barriers to unity. Friendship matters, so come with an attitude of "doing whatever it takes" (i.e., more than is expected of you, including getting out of your comfort zone) to extend gestures of friendship with EVERYONE present.

Discipline matters. Bring a sense of determination on Sunday. Without discipline, we end up quitting most of what we resolve to do. Most of us starve our minds for God's truth all during the week. Bring your heart connected with your mind. Darlene tell us, "the heart is the engine room of our life." Unpack your pride before leaving home, for thinking too highly of yourself blocks God's agenda for renewal of your heart and mind.

Above all, bring a sense of expectation. It's easy to settle for a dull, average experience. God doesn't want us to settle for less than full restoration. So, pack all of your passion and enter God's gates full of energy! The Holy Spirit will respond and multiply your enthusiasm. Enthusiasm is contagious!

As Darlene says in Extravagant Worship, 'Worship is a divine privilege, and with that privilege comes great responsibility to show generosity to others in the body of Christ through all we do. We should never leave worship to the pastors and worship leaders. WE all need to learn to be excellent, extravagant worshipers, generous in our service to one another and generous in our expression of love toward one another—it will change the dynamics of the harvest."

We are invited to benefit from a great feast: called to reap the great harvest of extravagant, saving love that Jesus cultivated in his ministry, death and resurrection. Let joy abound! Let feasting on God's Word, Sacraments, and Christian fellowship continue! Let our feast become a "most joyous space" for this fifty days!

Pastor Linda will attend, and we can carpool in her car. This will be an open forum to ask questions and voice comments or concerns about the direction in which our Conference is going or to suggest ways in which Conference and District could be of more assistance to local churches.

Saturday, April 19 at 6 PM is the last public church dinner for the year at the North Grafton Church! The menu is Chicken Kiev. Cost is \$8 for adults, \$4 for children, free for toddlers. Make your reservation by calling June Murray, who is cooking, at 508-839-2839 by Wednesday, April 16. This is a great way to share a fellowship meal with our sister church and to help them raise money for new sanctuary carpeting, which the Conference insurance carrier is requiring for safety reasons.

W.H.O. (Women Helping Others) is hot on the trail (as usual) in mission to our community. ALL women of all ages who attend our church, regardless of your membership status, are encouraged to join WHO for FUN and action. WHO will do a "double-header" mission on Saturday, April 19.
