Pastors Column: Greetings from John Wesley's Homeland

As most of you know, I was privileged to travel to London in May to attend Sir Richard Branson's conversation with members of the London Business Forum. As the only clergy in attendance at this meeting of business gurus, I was feeling a little out of place as I crossed the street from Westminster Abbey to Central Hall, Westminster, where the meeting was to take place. Imagine my astonishment when I realized that Central Hall was Central *Methodist* Hall, erected in the 1800s, in memory of John and Charles Wesley and in honor of all that Methodism has meant to the world.

As I climbed the stairs to the third floor and passed the imposing portrait of John Wesley, I said a prayer of thanksgiving: God is so good...when we feel called to put ourselves in unlikely situations, God will always go before us and prepare the way. Here I was, seeking new wisdom half-way around the world, and God graciously seen to put me in the midst of that wisdom in a Methodist Church. Needless to say, I probably felt more at home in that church than did the "business types."

The location was not my only amazement that afternoon. In his journal on June 11, 1739, Wesley wrote, "I look on all the world as my parish; thus far I mean, that, in whatever part of it I am, I judge it meet, right, and my bounden duty, to declare unto all that are willing to hear, the glad tidings of salvation." This teaching of Wesley is a foundation of Methodist mission and ministry: we are to engage in "shirt-sleeves" ministry wherever we find ourselves. Wesley wisely knew that sick, oppressed and deprived people could not hear the salvation message until their immediate needs were cared for. Thus, we are called to be Good Samaritans, binding up the wounds of the world and then delivering the good news: teaching by example as did Christ!

Special Offering: Education Wing Roof

In order to keep our church building insurable, our property *insurance carrier is requiring us to roof half of our Education wing before the snow flies this Fall*. It is so damaged that it will not survive this coming winter without leaking and ruining all the beautiful painting and flooring renovations volunteers have made to the classrooms, halls and bathrooms. Therefore, we need immediate donations to cover the cost, which has been graciously discounted by a local contractor.

We must raise \$10,000 by September 1.

This expense is not covered anywhere in our budgets. The Trustees have no funds to cover this expense because special contributions to date have replaced only a tiny fraction of the cost of our lift which depleted our investments. If our building suffers damage and we have to file a claim, there is a \$23,000 deductible per claim! Therefore, it is much wiser for us to raise the \$10,000 and fix the roof properly.

The second amazement was to hear Sir Richard saying that his priority is using his business assets to leverage support for social justice in the world. When questioned about his mentors, Sir Richard did not name one business guru. Rather, he surrounds himself with Christians who have long histories of promoting social justice on the ground: Bishop Desmond Tutu, Nelson Mandela, and former President Jimmy Carter. What powerful work God was doing that afternoon, using a business person who “gets it” about the world being the concern of the business world, to penetrate the “bottom line” mentality of the business world with a conscience-raising message.

We can only pray that God will continue to work through a few enlightened business leaders to push a sense of wider social conscience. Meanwhile, the Church has fallen way behind in living up to its full potential of making the world a better and more righteous place, perhaps because the Church has allowed itself to become overshadowed by and intimidated by the success of the materialistic corporate world. I believe that John Wesley would not want us to be harsh and judgmental about the situation but simply to be solution-oriented. He said, “The longer I live, the larger allowances I make for human infirmities. I exact more from myself, and less from others. Go thou and do likewise!”

During my brief stay in London, it was my privilege to pray for you all at Morning Prayer at St. Paul's and again at evenson at Westminster Abbey. I spent an afternoon in John Wesley's home and private chapel bringing each family of our congregation to mind in prayer. Then, I prayed for you all on Sunday morning in the chapel at Heathrow Airport as I was waiting for my return flight, at the same time as you all were in worship here.

As my flight gained altitude, I looked down on London one last time. The words of Wesley were again flying through my mind: “the best of it all is, God is with us.” Truly, God allows us to venture into new circumstances so that we can have a view of more of God's world as it is and as it could be. The best part is that God is with us, always watching with divine hope that we will make wise choices about the glimpses God has given us of the world.

As God is with us, let our hearts sing, “Make me a channel of your peace, where there is hatred, let me bring your love, where there is injury, your pardon Lord, and where there's doubt, true faith in you. O Master grant that I may never seek so much to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love with all my soul.”
