# Blessings for a Round, Sweet New Year!

Last Monday, the Marlborough Interfaith clergy gathered at Temple Emmanuel at the invitation of Rabbi Sherri Kohler-Fox. Since it was our first gathering since May, we celebrated the beginning of a new year of supportive fellowship and ecumenical work for the good of our whole community. Thanks to the Rabbi, however, we received a double blessing, for the Temple had just finished preparing for the Jewish New Year celebration. We met outside, for the Jewish sacred festival of Sukkot (Feast of the Tabernacles) was also beginning.

This feast was established while the Israelites were wandering in the desert. The Lord told Moses to instruct the Israelites to hold a seven-day feast that included sacred assemblies and offerings. (Leviticus 23:33-38) Deuteronomy 16:13-15 further directs the Feast of Tabernacles to be held the end of harvest. Families, including all servants, were to gather, joyfully celebrating God's blessings of abundance. Rabbi Sherri explained that the Feast of Tabernacles also commemorates God's deliverance from slavery in Egypt.

Therefore, the festival is celebrated in temporary structures which some Bible translations calls "booths." Families build these structures in their yards and temples. They eat all meals and spend much time in them just as our common Israelite ancestors did. Staying in a temporary shelter reminds us that God provides for us in all circumstances.

The sukkot shelter (pronounced sue-cot) is built out of natural materials, usually a framework of wood. The sky must remain visible, but most of the roof frame is covered with evergreen boughs. The walls and ceiling are adorned with hanging harvest vegetables of all kinds. Temple Emmanuel's sukkot was replete with hanging eggplants, broccoli bunches, beets, etc. tied with colorful ribbons and strings. Strings of small lights added to the happy atmosphere.

As we sat at a simple table on simple chairs with the carpet of grass under our feet, Rabbi Sherri wished us a happy new year and gave us apple slices which we dipped in honey. Try it! It's very tasty! This Jewish New Year treat symbolizes our wish for a sweet new year. Apples are used because they are naturally round, with no sharp edges. Therefore, Rabbi was helping us embody our wish for a smooth, sweet new year.

Rabbi then showed us the traditional bouquet of Four Species of plants: date frond (much like the palm leaves we use on Palm Sunday), myrtle tree boughs, and willow branches.

It's not too early to plan ahead. The **annual Marlborough Interfaith Thanksgiving service** is set for Monday evening, November 19 at 7 PM at Immaculate Conception Church. Our own Pastor Linda will be preaching!

These are bound together at the base with intricately woven palm leaves. The fourth Species is represented by a fruit called the "etrog." Etrogs are lemony-yellow, bumpy and elliptical. They grow upward on bushes and then droop toward the ground when heavy and ripe. Together with the leaf bouquet, prayers are said for the holy days. And so, the Rabbi prayed this stirring prayer:

Blessed are you, Lord, our God, sovereign of the universe who creates the fruit of the vine, who made all things exist through His word. Blessed are you, Lord, our God, sovereign of the universe who has chosen us from among all people, and exalted us above every tongue and sanctified us with His commandments. And you gave us, Lord our God, with love Sabbaths for rest, and appointed festivals for gladness, festivals and times for joy this day of the festival of Sukkot, the time of our gladness a holy convocation, a memorial of the exodus from Egypt because You have chosen us and made us holy from all peoples and your holy festivals in gladness and in joy you have given us for an inheritance. Blessed are you, Lord, who sanctifies the Sabbath and Israel and the seasons. Amen.

As we finish getting our new school/church program year underway, we can be joyful and thankful along with our Jewish friends. We see signs of harvest around us everywhere in local fields, farm stands, grocery stores and decorated yards. We can all look back over 2007 and see how God continues to bless us with safety, friendships, family, and deliverance from illnesses or troubles. We have much in common with our Jewish friends: common Israelite ancestors, common commandments to care lovingly for each other, and a God whose covenant ensures that we have Sabbaths for rest, restoration and worship.

Only God knows what this new year will bring. But, in the midst of everything that happens, let us remember the sukkots, the temporary shelters, and what they mean: the Living God shelters us and provides for us in all circumstances. In the meantime, it is a privilege and pleasure to walk with you into this new year. Let us all make a new year's resolution to treasure our church, which is the very Tabernacle of God, and treasure meeting together above all other earthly activities, to celebrate The Lord's Day each Sabbath.
