Dear Partners in Ministry: **FINANCIAL CRISIS** filled all the headlines in 1857. It is reported that the financial panic of 1857 thrust the northeastern United States into a lengthy depression. Sound familiar? Yet in Enfield, NH, 24 Methodists gathered and decided to build their first church building, anyway. In spite of the "economic conditions," their dreams were big (a church to seat 350, use the best lumber... after all, this was God's work!). In May 1858, with the 24 families giving sacrificially between \$15 and \$100, they raised almost \$1,000 (big money in those days). By October, the building was underway and the numbers had grown to 34 families who now raised another \$2,000 to complete the building where people have now gathered for 150 years through multiple financial crises, wars, and panics. Here, Christ has met them with blessing and strength and the gift of the greatest treasures of life: faith, hope and love.

September 21, we gathered to re-consecrate this 150-year-old building. It is a wonderful small membership congregation that is part of a charge. In spite of the "economic conditions" of today, they offer a free supper every Wednesday evening. They operate a food bank and a thrift shop that is open three days a week. For four years they have sent a Volunteer in Mission team to Louisiana and may send one to Iowa also this year. They give 100% of their Mission Shares so they can be fully a part of missions around the world. Visitation teams go out visiting regularly...worship is lively...the hospitality and welcome excellent...is it any surprise that new geople are coming and they are growing...."in spite of the economic conditions!"

It can be true for every congregation.

We are called to minister even and especially to our tiniest ones in a safe and adequate manner. Thanks to our Trustees, our nursery is now being professionally cleaned! Now, we need to ensure that we have TWO caregivers in the nursery at all times. Our older youth have been wonderful helpers in the nursery, but we need at least ONE PARENT OR ONE GRANDPARENT to sign up for each week. If every parent or grand parent takes one Sunday, we will be able to staff the nursery according to our Safe Sanctuary Policy. The bigger blessing will be knowing that our wee ones are getting an "intergenerational" experience that is missing in so much of society today. A sign-up sheet will be available in the Vestry.

CHRISTIAN ECONOMICS

I had a Seminary Professor who used to challenge us to think about the teachings and way of Jesus as we think about our economic life together. What about wealth and "commonwealth?" What about the rich, and camels, and eyes of needles? Why was "lending" with interest charged seen as the sin of usury? (Wesley was very clear about this...if he were here today, he might say, "I told you so.") Is there a word from the Lord in this time of asking questions about our economy and the world economy? I encourage you as pastors and laity to have special groups to talk about these things in the light of our current crisis. We need to be alert and caring about the economic circumstances of our sisters and brothers in the church and in the community. Those living in Massachusetts are facing a referendum that will eliminate the state income tax, 40% of the budget, and, by implication, dozens of our most important programs for children, and the most vulnerable in our "commonwealth." (Get informed and vote.) The church is the place where we need to pray, talk, and live the Christian life as it connects with the real challenges facing us in this economy. Let us be partners in this ministry—Bishop Weaver.

Central Massachusetts Lay Speaking Courses Are Back!

The United Methodist Church believes in the "priesthood of all believers." Therefore, we celebrate a very long history—beginning in the 1700s when there were no ordained clergy in New England. Lay preachers volunteered to "take up the slack" can continue to do so into the 21st century, particularly in churches with half-time pastors like FUMC Marlborough, where worship and visitation functions need extra support.

Currently, we are blessed with three dedicated Lay Speakers: Mathew Alexander, Sue Lodi and Jan Racca. However, a church our size needs at least 6 so that we don't burn out a few doing all the work. So, our goal this Fall is to train Three More Lay Speakers for Marlborough.

Please prayerfully consider attending the Basic Lay Speaking Course this Fall so that you can be affirmed officially at our Charge Conference in November. If you are already a Local Church Lay Speaker, you need to take an advanced course this Fall to become a Certified Lay Speaker. Lay Leaders are required by the *Discipline* to be Certified Lay Speakers. Here is the information:

- Lay Speaking Ministries Basic Course: Focus on many lay speaking ministries: preaching, leading, teaching, serving, proclaiming the gospel, disciple-making, storytelling, growing through personal spiritual formation. The book introduces skills in caring, leading and communicating. Completion of the Basic Course is required for Lay Speaker Certification.
- Lay Speakers Discover Spiritual Gifts—Advanced Course: Focus is on acquiring better understanding of needs of church ministry and being more fully equipped to lead others in exploring and using their spiritual gifts.
- Lay Speakers Lead Bible Study: Advanced Course: Used in conjunction with William Barclay's latest edition of "Introducing the Bible." Helps lay speakers become versed in how to teach and lead Bible Study.

Don't Forget to Bring Food Offerings the First Sunday of Each Month.

We always have a suggestion for items urgently needed at the Food Bank, but the truth is that <u>any non-perishable food items that are still within the expiration dates are needed!</u> Every time you go to the store, please pick up one extra item and bring it to the Food Pantry box in the Vestry. Each First Sunday, in keeping with the tradition of almsgiving at Communion, a tradition that we can trace back even to the earliest Christian years, we bless our offerings on the altar and then send them to the Food Bank. Our local Food Pantry serves 600+ families each month. <u>September and October are historically the lowest donation months of the year.</u> It's a shame when the Pantry has to close because it is empty. The overwhelming majority of hungry families in Marlborough are <u>working poor, single mothers, handicapped individuals, and elderly.</u> Ever month, these households must choose between purchasing food or medicine or utilities. We worship a God who put plenty of resources in the world. It's up to us to make sure that those resources are adequately distributed in our town. Here is a list of SUGGESTED ITEMS; IF YOU DON'T LIKE THESE, BRING SOMETHING ELSE! POST THIS LIST ON YOUR REFRIGERATOR OR NEAR YOUR GROCERY LIST:

First Sunday in October: cold cereals

First Sunday in November: black beans, kidney beans, baked beans

First Sunday in December: jars of baby food, especially fruit, baby cereal

First Sunday in January: hot cereals

First Sunday in February: spaghetti sauce in cans or jars First Sunday in March: baby formula (Enfamil, Similac, etc.)

First Sunday in April: jelly or jam

First Sunday in May: canned tuna, especially white tuna

First Sunday in June: crackers (all varieties), cookies, raisins, granola bars, popcorn

First Sunday in July: diapers (size 3,4 or 5 are most needed)

First Sunday in August: shampoo, crème rinse, soap, toothpaste, deodorant
